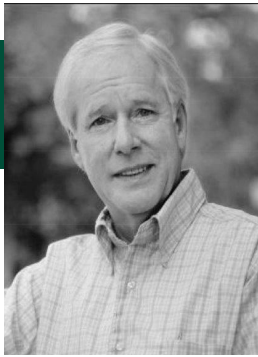

**CHARLIE
CAIN**

Charlie Cain not only made an impact. He was an institution.

During a 39-year news career, Cain forged a reputation as a premier state capital correspondent who enjoyed the respect of state leaders, colleagues, competitors and legislators who were often on the receiving end of his stories.

His philosophy was: Get it right, get it first and make it fair and readable. His commitment to excellence inspired younger colleagues and made state government accessible and understandable to The Detroit News readers. He was objective, honest and accurate.

He grew up in Detroit and was the son of prominent Associated press reporters. While studying journalism at Michigan State University, he was the managing editor of the campus State News and worked summers for The Detroit News. He joined The News as a suburban reporter when he graduated in 1973.

After his award-winning coverage of the 1976 contract talks between the United Auto Workers and the Big Three carmakers, The News sent Cain to Lansing where he became a senior correspondent and State Capital Bureau Chief. He chronicled major controversies, political brawls on the floors of the House and Senate and the ups and downs of state power brokers.

He became one of the foremost experts on the modern history of state government. One of the most remarkable things about Cain was his uncanny memory. "He was the greatest repository of political and government history in this state. He never forgot a name or an event," remembered a colleague.

Cain was recognized for his excellence in newswriting with the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Michigan Society of Professional Journalists; the Wade H. McCree, Jr. Award from the State Bar of Michigan; the Associated Press Public Service Award and two United Press International awards, among others. Under Cain's leadership, his staffers also won prestigious awards, including a Pulitzer Prize.

Cain joined Truscott Rossman, a Lansing government-consulting firm in 2009, where he was a senior writer and editor. He died in July 2011.



**BETTY
DeRAMUS**

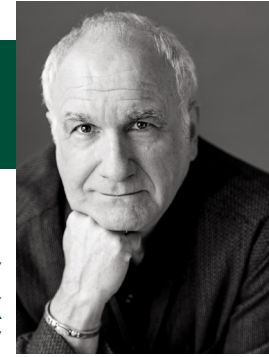
During a career that spanned five decades, Betty DeRamus took readers by the hand and led them through the dizzying, sometimes scary and often uplifting human landscape of Detroit, a city she loves. She has been one of the best in the business, a journalist with a poet's flair and a reporter's persistence.

DeRamus wasn't born in Detroit, but her soul was. And that soul compelled her to go out and find stories that pulse with the heartbeat of Detroit: award-winning, life-affirming stories about hard-working folks like her parents who brought her here from Alabama in the early 1940s; stories about young, empty-eyed dope dealers and the brave citizens who refused to surrender their neighborhoods and their dreams to them.

She wrote unflinchingly about race, and called both blacks and whites to task for their words and behavior. She wrote about people who ran for their lives through the underground railroad. And, she traveled across the country and across the seas to infuse life into the stories behind the headlines—stories about individuals affected by hunger in Africa or the election of Nelson Mandela or the Los Angeles riots.

Because of the depth of her reporting and the beauty of her writing, DeRamus received dozens of awards. Among them: the Overseas Press Club of America, Eugene C. Pulliam Award, Writer's Digest, Best of Gannett, Charles Steward Mott Foundation, National Association of Black Journalists, Michigan Press Association, and as a Pulitzer Prize finalist. She was the only American journalist chosen to tour Central African refugee camps after the massacres in Rwanda.

DeRamus graduated from Wayne State University and got her start at the Michigan Chronicle. She was a reporter and then editorial writer at the Detroit Free Press from 1972 to 1987, when the The Detroit News hired her as a columnist. She retired from The News in 2006. DeRamus was a founding member of the Detroit Chapter of the National Association of Black Journalists.



**HARVEY
KUREK
OVSHINSKY**

"Find your backyard," is one of many Harvey-isms. This one comes from his favorite children's poet, James Stevenson: "Front yards are boring. Backyards tell stories." With his "backyard" stories, Harvey Ovshinsky has been a pathfinder and guide during his five-decade career that straddles print, broadcast, digital, the big screen and the classroom.

In 1965, Ovshinsky, then 17, heard hardly anything about teenagers or black people. There was practically nothing written about the anti-war movement or poor people or women's issues, unless it was on the society pages.

So he started The Fifth Estate, the country's oldest surviving "underground" newspaper in the country. Writing with purpose and passion, in the style of Tom Wolfe and what others later called New Journalism, the Fifth Estate reported on local anti-war and civil rights protests, the growing feminist movements, and the innovative works of area poets, artists and musicians such as Chuck and Joni Mitchell, and Cass Corridor artists such as Brenda Goodman.

At 22, Ovshinsky became the first news director of Detroit's alternative radio station at WABX-FM and a talk show host. He broadcast hour-long coverages of the Goose Lake Music Festival, the Balduck and Memorial Park riots between young people and the police, and John Kerry's Winter Soldier investigation into alleged war crimes by U.S. troops.

He moved into television at WXYZ-TV and went on to produce documentaries for local and national broadcasts on difficult subjects such as youth violence, politics and race, and young people and depression. He continues to hold production workshops and storytelling seminars to generations of budding journalists at several universities.

Ovshinsky has received many awards including 15 regional Emmys, a national Emmy, a Peabody and a DuPont-Columbia University Award Silver Baton and multiple film festival recognitions, in addition to being nominated for an Oscar.

"Harvey finds his best work in Detroit, not Hollywood," wrote the Metro Times. "With all of his success," wrote Metromode, "he still works out of the basement office. And he isn't leaving anytime soon."

2015 STATE BAR OF MICHIGAN

WADE H. MCCREE AWARDS FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF JUSTICE

The State Bar of Michigan Wade H. McCree Jr. Awards for the Advancement of Justice are named for one of the most venerable lawyers and judges in Michigan's history. Judge McCree served as a federal judge and solicitor general of the United States, and he dedicated himself to advancing a greater understanding of the vital role journalists play in a free society. This is the 41st year the State Bar has granted these awards to Michigan journalists.

The first McCree Award goes to the Michigan Radio team of Jennifer Guerra, Sarah Alvarez and Sarah Hulett. Their series, called "Finding Home: A Documentary about Foster Care in Michigan," investigated improvements made to Michigan's foster care system, which oversees the care of more than 13,000 children and has been under federal oversight since 2008.

The second McCree Award goes to Detroit Free Press reporters Nathan Bomey, John Gallagher and Mark Stryker for a special report about Detroit's bankruptcy, called "How Detroit Was Reborn." The piece, marking the end of months of Free Press coverage of the historic bankruptcy, told the backstory of the behind-the-scenes conversations and deals that ended in Detroit's Grand Bargain.

The third McCree Award goes to the team of WDET journalists Joan Isabella, Sandra Svoboda and Courtney Hurtt for the website, NextChapterDetroit.com, and a series of broadcast reports and open community forums on Detroit's historic bankruptcy case.

The fourth McCree Award goes to MLive Media Group reporter Brad Devereaux for a series, "Small Town, Big Problems," that chronicled a number of legal actions involving a small town police chief and an unorthodox program to raise tens of thousands of dollars in unregulated funds.

An Honorable Mention Award goes to The Detroit News reporter Mike Martindale for a story, "Judge on Leave to Quit After Re-election," that brought to light a deal worked out among court officials to allow a district judge suspected of improper behavior in his official position to seek re-election and then quietly retire from the court system. Martindale uncovered e-mails indicating that city, court and state officials knew of the scandal and agreed to keep it from voters.

MICHIGAN NEWSPAPER HALL OF FAME

The Hall of Fame recognizes journalists and educators who have established their professional reputations predominately in the state of Michigan.

The Michigan Journalism Hall of Fame welcomes nominations. This checklist is intended to assist you in submitting a nomination to the Michigan Journalism Hall of Fame Committee. The Committee will base its decision primarily on the material supplied by the nominators.

Nomination material must include:

- A completed nomination form signed by the nominator. The Hall of Fame Committee will consider any nomination received before the January deadline.
- A typed statement that clearly demonstrates how the nominee satisfies the criteria and is therefore qualified for membership in the Hall of Fame. This statement should emphasize the nominee's professional journalism career in Michigan. It is not expected that all criteria will apply or apply equally.
- Clips, photos, video, audio or online samples documenting a nominee's work as a journalist and demonstrating his or her impact. These materials become part of the historical record of the Hall of Fame, justifying the nominee's selection.

Criteria are:

- Integrity
- Courage
- Innovation
- Achievement
- Leadership
- Contribution to the industry
- Influence on individuals in the profession.
- At least five but no more than 10 letters of testimony that address any or all of the selection criteria. These letters should document and support assertions that appear in the nomination statement.
- Anecdotes and examples that address specific selection criteria. This material may be presented in the nomination statement or in testimonial letters.
- The nominee's resumé or curriculum vita.
- Other relevant documents that support the nomination, such as clips, tapes, etc.
- Include a 350-word summary of the nominee's accomplishments that can be placed in the ceremony program.
- Nominators should submit **two electronic copies** of all materials except for books, tapes, DVDs, etc.
