**DIXIE
FRANKLIN**

Transplanted Texan Dixie Franklin has contributed to Michigan's travel journalism across four decades.

Franklin's articles and mentoring have enriched Michigan's citizens and visitors and helped elevate one of the state's signature industries. Franklin's work has earned respect and praise from editors, fellow writers and travel communicators. They laud her integrity, warmth, storytelling talent and knowledge of the Great Lakes State.

Franklin adopted Michigan in 1960 when, as a military wife with two young daughters, she and her family moved to the K. I. Sawyer Air Force Base near Marquette. "I'd never heard of the Upper Peninsula, but when I saw cattails with snow on them, I knew I was home," she said.

While working for a Marquette dentist, Franklin sold her first article, to a trade magazine. She then successfully pitched an idea to the editor of The Mining Journal in Marquette for a weekly newspaper column about local personalities. She also became a Michigan stringer for The Milwaukee Journal.

Soon, the dental assistant was traveling the world and contributing travel and outdoor articles to numerous magazines and newspapers. Franklin developed a specialty in stories about Michigan, especially her adopted U.P. Her byline appeared on thousands of articles, including a monthly column for Michigan Out-of-Doors (1977-84). Books followed. Awards rolled in.

Franklin freely shared her knowledge with writers and students and applied her Michigan expertise to advancing tourism public relations.

Franklin worked with the Travel Journalists Guild in protecting writers' rights, served as president of Midwest Travel Writers Association and on the Society of American Travel Writers' board. She became the first woman chair of Michigan Outdoor Writers. At 88, Franklin is working on a collection of never-before-told-tales. "I knew growing up I was a writer, but I didn't know how to become one." Yet, she says, "I wasn't afraid. I just did it."



**JULIAN H.
GONZALEZ**

Bars and basement walls across Michigan are decorated with newspaper pages that immortalize Michigan's most historic sports moments. If you look closer, beyond the headline and the exciting photo of "the" moment from that particular game, you're likely to see the credit of Julian H. Gonzalez/Detroit Free Press.

For 25 years, Gonzalez dedicated himself to capturing Michigan sports heroes' victories and defeats, creating indelible images that are forever connected to sports lore in the collective consciousness of sports fans. There's Steve Yzerman hoisting his first Stanley Cup, Justin Verlander celebrating his first no-hitter, the two Wallaces (Ben and Rasheed) dancing their way to the NBA finals.

Gonzalez was in the Marine Corps when he took a photography class while stationed in Japan. He studied photojournalism at the University of Kansas and worked his way through school as a photographer for the university and the Lawrence Journal-World, with an internship at the Kansas City Times. After graduating in 1983, he had stops at The Lafayette Journal & Courier in Indiana, the Gannett Rochester newspapers in New York and The Detroit News. He joined the Detroit Free Press in 1990.

Gonzalez photographed some of the best Michigan athletes of all time. He also covered seven Olympics, one Pan-American Games, six NCAA Final Fours, five NHL playoffs, three NBA championships and numerous golf, swimming, auto and track and field competitions.

His work has been published in Time Magazine, Newsweek, TV Guide, Sports Illustrated and on the cover of Smithsonian Magazine. His work has garnered top awards from the National Press Photographers Association for Pictures of the Year as well as state awards in Kansas, Indiana, New York and Michigan.

Gonzalez' long legacy of great sports photography is forever linked to Michigan's sports history, and his dedication to his profession is forever linked to Michigan's journalism history.



**LOU
MLECZKO**

Lou Mleczeko never flinched as he blew the whistle on negligent or corrupt authorities in his effort to make Detroit a better place to live and work.

Mleczeko began his career with the Center Line Cub high school newspaper. He worked at The Macomb Daily as a sports and general assignment reporter, covering the 1968 World Series in Detroit and Red Wings hockey, while being an honors college student in journalism at Wayne State University. After graduation in 1969, he moved to the Akron Beacon Journal and was one of the first at the Kent State University shootings. He made The Detroit News his home from 1971 to 1995.

Mleczeko broke front-page stories on the premature deterioration of state bridges and pavement, resulting in the re-examination of regulations allowing trucks to carry twice the load allowed by federal standards. His columns on scandalous automobile repairs led to statewide licensing of auto mechanics and repair shops. He reported exclusive stories about fire and building code violations in the construction of Joe Louis Arena, the Renaissance Center and the Pontiac Silverdome. He covered contract talks between the United Auto Workers and the Big Three automakers, and a 28-day strike against Ford Motor Company that idled more than 170,000 workers nationwide.

Growing up walking picket lines with his father, Mleczeko carried a revolutionary's spirit his entire career. That included 38 years as a Detroit Newspaper Guild leader, grappling with publishers to secure better wages, benefits and conditions for hundreds of Michigan newsroom employees.

His investigative stories represented outstanding journalism and made Michigan a safer and better place. His care and concern have been recognized with awards from Michigan United Press International, the Detroit Press Club, the National Society of Professional Engineers, Wayne State University's Outstanding Journalism Alumni Award and Sigma Delta Chi's Journalist of the Year.



**ROCHELLE
RILEY**

Rochelle Riley has spent 15 years writing award-winning columns for the Detroit Free Press, where she has been a passionate crusader for children and a courageous advocate for community responsibility. She has focused on education, popular culture, politics and race. Riley spent 14 years raising awareness about the need to improve adult literacy and helped raise more than \$1 million to increase literacy.

Riley began her career in her home state of North Carolina and moved on to reporting and editing stints in Dallas, Fort Worth and Washington, D.C. In a trailblazing promotion at The Courier-Journal in Louisville, Kentucky, in 1992, she became a news executive. There, she supervised six departments, edited numerous award-winning projects and helped plan annual coverage of the Kentucky Derby. In 1996, she became a columnist. Her debut column, which called on Louisville to build a museum to honor Louisville native Muhammad Ali, helped spur an \$80 million campaign to build the Muhammad Ali Center. It opened in 2005.

Riley was a 2007-2008 Knight-Wallace journalism fellow at the University of Michigan. There, she studied online communities and film. A strong advocate for press freedom around the world, Riley is co-chair of the National Association of Black Journalists Global Journalism Task Force and a board member of the North American Committee of the International Press Institute.

For the consistent high quality of her journalism and her dedicated service to the community, Riley has received dozens of awards. Her honors include the 2013 National Headliner Award for best column, a national Scripps Howard award for her coverage of literacy, and first-place honors from the National Association of Black Journalists, the Michigan Press Association and the Associated Press Managing Editors. In 2015, Hour magazine readers named Riley the best female columnist in Detroit for the sixth year in a row.

WADE H. MCCREE JR. AWARDS FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF JUSTICE

The State Bar of Michigan Wade H. McCree Jr. Awards for the Advancement of Justice are named for one of the most venerable lawyers and judges in Michigan's history. Judge McCree served as a federal judge and solicitor general of the United States, and he dedicated himself to advancing a greater understanding of the vital role journalists play in a free society. INDUCTION CRITERIA

1952-1968

MICHIGAN NEWSPAPER HALL OF FAME

The Hall of Fame recognizes journalists and educators who have established their professional reputations predominately in the state of Michigan.

The Michigan Journalism Hall of Fame welcomes nominations. This checklist is intended to assist you in submitting a nomination to the Michigan Journalism Hall of Fame Committee. The Committee will base its decision primarily on the material supplied by the nominators.

Nomination material must include:

- A completed nomination form signed by the nominator. The Hall of Fame Committee will consider any nomination received before the January deadline.
- A typed statement that clearly demonstrates how the nominee satisfies the criteria and is therefore qualified for membership in the Hall of Fame. This statement should emphasize the nominee's professional journalism career in Michigan. It is not expected that all criteria will apply or apply equally.
- Clips, photos, video, audio or online samples documenting a nominee's work as a journalist and demonstrating his or her impact. These materials become part of the historical record of the Hall of Fame, justifying the nominee's selection.

Criteria are:

- Integrity
- Courage
- Innovation
- Achievement
- Leadership
- Contribution to the industry
- Influence on individuals in the profession.
- At least five but no more than 10 letters of testimony that address any or all of the selection criteria. These letters should document and support assertions that appear in the nomination statement.
- Anecdotes and examples that address specific selection criteria. This material may be presented in the nomination statement or in testimonial letters.
- The nominee's resumé or curriculum vita.
- Other relevant documents that support the nomination, such as clips, tapes, etc.
- Include a 350-word summary of the nominee's accomplishments that can be placed in the ceremony program.
- Nominators should submit **two electronic copies** of all materials except for books, tapes, DVDs, etc.
